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President's Report 2018

WHO had an excellent 2019. WHO members successfully delivered events locally and nationally. Thank you for your contributions. WHO has a great culture of helping and organising quality events and this reputation is a reflection of the contribution from club members.

In May, WHO took on a considerable challenge with the NSW Middle Distance and Long Distance Championships that were also rounds of the National Orienteering League and selection trials for the Australian team. Special praise is justly deserved for the large team that delivered the Wyangala and Roseberg events. This was a multi-year contribution starting when Graeme Hill updated the Wyangala map onto OCAD software. Rob Vincent did the fieldwork to bring the Wyangala map up to date, as it had not been used for around 20 years. Rob also updated the Roseberg map so we had two excellent areas. The course setters were Robert Bradley for Wyangala and Steve Dunlop for Roseberg. James McQuillan was the organiser with Rob Vincent from Newcastle the overall controller. Tim Perry led the computer team. This was the first time WHO had organised National Orienteering League events with another first being the Roseberg ultra-long of 24kms with a mass start and map changes.

Another notable 2019 achievement was recorded by the WHO juniors, with three selected for the NSW Carbines team. They participated at the Oceania/Australian Championships in the NSW Riverina and contributed to NSW winning the Australian Schools Championships Trophy. Congratulations to Niamh Cassar, Martine Valais and Selwyn Sweeney.

At this time last year WHO membership was 108. It is now 121. Our growth pattern continues.

In the WHO club championship it was a close fought contest between Janet Morris, Niamh Cassar and James McQuillan with the results from the Oceania events deciding the order of our three worthy candidates. The full table is later in this report.

Bold Horizons continued the Hills District SOS in Terms 2 and 3 and WHO was pleased to assist. The SOS provides an excellent introduction to orienteering and an opportunity to guide and advise participants. The June Sydney West Schools events had record entries and expanded to three days. Ted Mulherin set the courses and a number of club members provided coaching and officials for the events. The Turkey Trot broke new ground with a move west to the tracks and creeks of the The Ponds / Stanhope Gardens / Rouse Hill area. On a cool July morning the trotters found they got their feet and a bit more wet as they crossed the creeks on Dmitry Stukov's courses.

WHO tried hard but didn't win a 2019 Metro League title. We had a lot of fun doing our best and look forward to continuing our efforts in 2020.

Today heralds the annual running of the WHO Cup with three prestigious trophies on offer. The Chris Crane Cup is awarded to the winner of the handicap event and the outright winners receive cups for the fastest female and fastest male orienteers.

The club was well supported by the committee and role holders. Thank you to the Executive team of Maureen Fitzpatrick (Secretary), Matt Hackett (Treasurer) and Steve Dunlop (Vice-President) and the office bearers for a successful year managing

the club. Some are stepping down which provides opportunities for others and helps keep the club vibrant with new ideas.

It has been an honour to serve as President. My time ends with the AGM. Thank you for all the support.

Looking ahead to 2020

The signs are positive. Our WHO junior numbers are growing. We have an enthusiastic and growing membership. We organise enjoyable events and have opportunities to recruit new members with the Western Series currently underway plus the Hills District SOS events and the June school events.

Treasurer's Report 2019

This report covers the full year period from 1st October, 2018 to 30th September, 2019.

Event Summary

During the year there were 13 events, same as the previous period. The details of each event are shown in the accompanying Annual Event Report. Highlights include:

- Over 2,000 entries across the 13 events,
- Total event income was more than the previous year due to the NOL/State League income from two days at Wyangala,
- Of the 13 events, all produced a surplus except for a deficit at the Metro League Final at Mulgoa due to additional costs for amenities.
- The surplus for the State League event does not include all mapping costs. In total costs for mapping the event in this period was over \$8,500.

Financial Results

The Income and Expenditure Report and the Balance sheet are available on request.

- ONSW sanctioning fees was the greatest expense item followed by mapping expenses and map printing,
- Despite a reasonable surplus for events conducted, all key costs have increased, notably increased ONSW sanction fees and access fees which will place pressure on the ability to build funds in the future for significant investments such as creating and updating maps as evidenced at Wyangala.

Club Captain's Report 2019

Metro League gave us plenty of great orienteering in 2019 culminating in WHO hosting one of the highest standard finals we have seen in years at Mulgoa. The season got off to a false start with Round 1 at Boronia Park being postponed to make way for a food & wine festival – with hindsight I'm sure we could have found a way to combine the two, although it could have seen some variable results. The maps we encountered during the season were diverse and each with their own unique challenges, from the exposed rock and thick bush of Allambie Heights, to the fast open running parkland of Nurragingy Reserve, deceptively challenging bushland at Galston Reserve, and the unique, if tiger pear-infested, munitions testing landscape of Wianamatta.

WHO again fielded a team in each division, although in the higher divisions we weren't able to consistently field a full complement, which impacted our results notwithstanding some great performances. Division 5 was easily our best performing team, continuing a tradition of the past few seasons of fielding some highly competitive Div 5 teams. Our Div 5 team was the only WHO team to be in finals contention, although Knox managed to take the honours at Mulgoa. Strong performances came from a number of people during the season, including Maria Stankova (top personal score of 33), Will Kay, Sylvie Lamborelle, Kathryn Vaughan, and Martine and Aurelie Valais.

Our consistently understrength Div 1 team still finished the season with heads held high, achieving the second highest number of points for the season albeit well behind title holders Big Foot. James McQuillan was our most consistent Div 1 runner, finishing with an individual tally of 40 points, although special mention should go to Dan Smith who had been promoted from Div 2 the previous year and proved his worth with a tally of 34 points and some great results.

Div 2 did not have a great year, again understrength in most rounds and not picking up a single win. But the shining light was Niamh Cassar who had been promoted from Div 3 the previous year and was our best Div 2 performer for the season with 32 points.

Div 3 did a little better picking up one win but again was hampered by lack of numbers in some rounds. Belinda Kinneally was by far the stand out picking up 43 points over all including a few 10 point rounds.

Div 4 did somewhat better picking up three wins for the season, and benefited from a mix of experience and new blood with the Valais sisters being promoted to DIv 4 early in the season. Annete Larsson picked up the highest personal score of 32 points, but strong performances came from a number of quarters, including Karen Langan, Martine Valais, Aurelie Valais and Kathryn Vaughan.

It was especially pleasing to welcome a few Metro League debutants this season, some of whom quickly rose up the ranks to higher divisions. Metro League is a great way to give beginners a taste of bush orienteering in an accessible way, and it was great to see some new names in Metro League teams such as Sylvie Lamborelle, Kathryn Vauqhan, Will Kay, Jacinta Braidwood, and the Sweeney family.

Changes are in store for the 2020 season, with ONSW currently contemplating the introduction of a 6th division. I'd strongly encourage all members to come along and try out Metro League – it's a great day out with plenty of team camaraderie. Contact club captain Josh Braidwood if you are interested in finding out more about Metro League – we would love to welcome some new team members in 2020.

Mapping Officer's Report 2019

WHO has had sufficient maps for events in 2019 without too frequent reuse of maps.

Country Maps

Remapping of Wyangala and Roseberg areas were completed by Rob Vincent and successfully used in our major event. Our only other current country map is Mt Piper Hills so we should follow up on possibly making an extension to the west of that map. Also a remap of part of the Timberlight map could be done. With no plans for a SL event in 2020 one of these could be used in 2022. The Rocky Creek / Pinnacles area at Newnes Plateau was visited and found to be still unsuitable for a map.

Sydney Maps

A wide range of maps are needed for Metro League, SSS, WSOS,SOS, MM, TT and sprints, of up to 15 per year. We have about 48 options for maps, though some overlap in areas such as Crestwood or Rouse Hill. So it is possible to use many areas no more than once every three years. I do not consider our city maps usually suitable for State League events. If we are to host a SL Sprint in 2021 it would be good to have a new major sprint map.

This year maps were completed at Plumpton Park and Tarrawarra Reserve. Both are small areas and will have limited use only in WSOS events.

The area of Mulgoa affected by a fire was extensive and was remapped for use in our Metro event.

The new Caddies Creek Sports field at Beaumont Hills (Caddies Creek) was mapped and used.

Ted Horwood Reserve has been mapped as a sprint map to be used first for the WHO Cup.

Fieldwork at Coups Creek (Wahroonga) is under way.

ONSW have requested that clubs annually map a local sandstone area. We have nominated an area of Bidjigal Reserve (Excelsior map) around Eric Mobbs Reserve as our first sandstone initiative to be completed in 2020. Maroota Ridge SCA would be suitable but NP refused permission to map.

Areas at Rouse Hill, Beaumont Hills and the Ponds were mapped or remapped for the Turkey Trot.

Permission has been given by Uringa for WHO to remap Duck River (Auburn) in 2020.

Paul Prudhoe is pursuing our request to make a map at Newington. Fieldwork was done and a map was prepared to show to the local authority (SOPA).

A visit was made with a ranger to Wianamatta Park (west, at Jordan Springs). Will be suitable to be mapped when permitted by NP.

Visits were made to Buxton SRA and Porters Road, Kenthurst but neither was suitable to map.
